I came from a truck farming background and knew that I wanted to be associated with machinery. Because of this agricultural background and the desire to be involved with machinery, I settled on agricultural engineering. However, at the time I attended LSU, there were only two of us enrolled in the agricultural engineering curriculum at the same level. Since it was not feasible to teach the course solely for two students, LSU allowed us to take the equivalent courses in mechanical and civil engineering. In the end, I honestly feel I finished with an engineering degree that was superior to finishing in either one of these three separately.

This way, each piece of machinery became an extension of yourself.

In later years, as the company grew and employees increased, the extension of their work continued to be a direct reflection on how well I was doing as a manager.

to me in the company today as well as some of my overseas associates who helped so much through the years; especially the ones that had faith in us in the beginning of the company.
